AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND

The AEF is a national grant assistance program that provides temporary emergency financial help to eligible ALA members. This assistance is meant to be a helping hand until financial stability is re-established. Eligible members must apply and be selected for a grant.



Applicants for this temporary assistance are considered when:

- Members are left without shelter or food following a natural disaster or weather emergency;
- Members are dealing with a financial crisis that leaves them without resources for shelter, food, or utilities – and no other source of aid is readily available; and
- In extreme circumstances, when members lack necessary skills for employment and need educational training.
- AEF funds **cannot** be used to pay debts (such as credit card debts) or medical expenses.

In the October bulletin from our Department Chairman Tammy Duron, she spoke a lot about the Child Welfare Foundation. Did you know the Child Welfare Foundation has been around since 1953? In 1955 three grants were given to three organizations, totaling \$22,000. But, to date the CWF has provided more than 18 million dollars to assist our nation's children. How awesome is that! And, in 2021 grants totaling \$766,761 were given to 24 nonprofits, including the National American Legion Auxiliary who received \$75,000 to support The ALA Girls Nation program, the Children of Warriors National President's Scholarship, the Spirit of Youth Scholarship, the Honorary National Junior Division Vice President Scholarship and the Junior Member Loyalty Scholarship.



So, you can see how important the Child Welfare Foundation really is. You can raise money for this program, just like some of our other programs like AEF. Have a fundraiser to raise money for this very worthwhile program and send it in to the department office. You could be considered for an award if you donate at least one dollar per member during the CWF award year. Check it out on the department website. It's in October's bulletin.

“Every Auxiliary Unit is expected to carry out or cooperate in at least one project for community betterment each year.

Each unit should have a Community Service Chairman in charge of Community Service projects. It is the duty of this chairman to study community needs, recommend projects to the Unit, then lead in the accomplishment of projects adopted, and report the work to the Department Community Service Committee. Support of Community Service projects of The American Legion Post is, of course, a first responsibility of the American Legion Auxiliary Unit. Go easy at first.

Try small projects, carrying them to completion. Experience will teach the Unit the type of projects which the community will support, and which are within the ability of the Unit to accomplish. Plan your projects – work your plan – publicize your results.”

Not every Unit has Chairmen to work programs, but the Unit does Community Service in numerous ways. Has anybody in the Unit donated Blood, helped with a food bank, volunteered in schools, helped with cancer programs, volunteered with the Boy Scouts or Girl Scouts, helped the Legion organize community events? All that counts for community service hours! Be sure to get members to track their hours and expenditures to report on the Mid-Year forms. - ◆ One (1) \$1,000 Mel Foronda Memorial Scholarship
- ◆ Two (2) \$1,000 scholarships payable at \$1,000 each
- ◆ Two (2) \$500 scholarships payable at \$500 each.

Legislative Report

The following is from an email sent by John Kamin of the American Legion which needs action now: "The American Legion's **"Buddy Check"** program has been a great tool for our membership, and we were proud to draft legislation that expands this program to VA. The Senate has approved legislation that would make this a national program. Now, let's make sure the House follows suit. If our Representatives don't act before Congress recesses next month, it could be at least three months before they consider this legislation again. Or it could be dropped altogether.



Join Our Action Campaign: Write Your Representative Now.

S. 544 would direct VA to establish a "Buddy Check Week," provide educational opportunities, materials, and references for veterans to learn how to conduct personal wellness checks, as well as require increased resources for the Veterans Crisis Line to handle any potential increased usage during the designated week. **The bill is modeled after the American Legion's "Buddy Check National Week of Calling"** to connect veterans to better ensure that they receive the care they need.

The American Legion launched **"Buddy Check Week"** in 2019. It has since been expanded and encourages Legionnaires to conduct veteran outreach as part of their daily routine. The idea is to reconnect with veterans who may need assistance but don't know where to go or who to ask.

Legislative (continued)

We've seen successful stories arise out of buddy checks, before and during the pandemic. Thanks to these efforts, older veterans have received assistance in getting food and medicine, as well as having a comforting voice to talk with even for a few minutes.

Just think if that goodwill could receive the support of Congress and VA. The help veterans receive from buddy checks would skyrocket. You can help make this a reality by contacting your House representative to tell them to pass S. 544 today. It takes just a few moments by visiting this link.

The American Legion proudly supports this legislation, and asks that you call on your Representative to pass S.544 today!"

Questions of Privilege

There are a few questions of privilege that are in order at any time and must be disposed of prior to resuming discussion on the matter at hand:



- **Fix the time for next meeting.** This is in order at any time, including when a motion to adjourn is pending. Second required, not debatable, and is amendable.
- **Adjourn.** To bring the meeting to a halt. Second required, not debatable, and not amendable. Alternatively, instead of a motion, the chair can ask if there is any further business. If there is no response, the chair can say, "Since there is no further business, the meeting is adjourned."
- **Recess.** A temporary break in the meeting; should state a time at which the meeting will resume. Second required, not debatable, and not amendable.
- **Point of privilege.** A matter that concerns the welfare of the group. Can be raised even when another person is speaking. No second, not debatable, and no vote required.

Parliamentarian (continued)

- **Call for the orders of the day.** A demand that the group return to the agenda. Can be taken when another person is speaking, no second required, not debatable, and no vote required.



From the Editor's Corner

The 11th hour...of the 11th day...of the 11th month...

The following is from a collection of historical facts from the Department of Defense. It was written November 15, 2018 by Katie Lange and titled "5 Facts to Know About Veterans Day".

A lot of people think it's "Veteran's Day" or "Veterans' Day," but they're wrong. The holiday is not a day that "belongs" to one veteran or multiple veterans, which is what an apostrophe implies. It's a day for honoring all veterans — so no apostrophe needed

Veterans Day is NOT the Same as Memorial Day.

A lot of Americans get this confused, and we'll be honest — it can be a little annoying to all of the living veterans out there. Memorial Day is a time to remember those who gave their lives for our country, particularly in battle or from wounds they suffered in battle. Veterans Day honors all of those who have served the country in war or peace — dead or alive — although it's largely intended to thank living veterans for their sacrifices.

It was originally called Armistice Day, commemorating the end of World War I.

World War I officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919. However, the fighting ended about seven months before that when the Allies and Germany put into effect an armistice on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month.

For that reason, Nov. 11, 1918, was largely considered the end of "the war to end all wars" and dubbed Armistice Day. In 1926, Congress officially recognized it as the end of the war, and in 1938, it became an official holiday, primarily a day set aside to honor veterans of World War I.

But then World War II and the Korean War happened, so on June 1, 1954, at the urging of veterans service organizations, Congress amended the commemoration yet again by changing the word "armistice" to "veterans" so the day would honor American veterans of all wars.

For a while, Veterans Day's date was changed, too, and it confused everybody.

Congress signed the Uniform Holiday Bill in 1968 to ensure that a few federal holidays — Veterans Day included — would be celebrated on a Monday. Officials hoped it would spur travel and other family activities over a long weekend, which would stimulate the economy.

For some inexplicable reason, the bill set Veterans Day commemorations for the fourth Monday of every October.

On Oct. 25, 1971, the first Veterans Day under this new bill was held. We're not sure why it took three years to implement, but not surprisingly, there was a lot of confusion about the change, and many states were unhappy, choosing to continue to recognize the day as they previously had — in November.

Within a few years, it became pretty apparent that most U.S. citizens wanted to celebrate Veterans Day on Nov. 11, since it was a matter of historic and patriotic significance. So on Sept. 20, 1975, President Gerald Ford signed another law (Public Law 94-97), which returned the annual observance to its original date starting in 1978.
